# Our congratulations and best wishes to all those celebrating special days in March!



Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ. Lent is one of my favorite times of the church year. Many are weary of Lent; however, I enjoy the meditative nature of the season. When I was in internship I wrote a Lenten devotional as part of my internship project. I would like to share the first 3 weeks of that devotional with all of you, in April I will share the final 2 weeks of the devotional. I am hoping this devotional will help you on your Lenten journey

Lenten Mid-Week devotionals that will begin on Wednesday March 12<sup>th</sup> at Durham. These devotionals are great opportunity to reflect on our relationship with God and one another. They are more conversational and personal. I hope to see you all there. Lent is a time of deep reflection and even fasting. I am often asked "What are you giving up for Lent". I always try to remind all that giving something up for Lent is a good practice. It helps remind us that God should be the focus in our lives. That the things that distract us and replace God are just empty idols. However, giving something up for 40 days and 40 nights just to go back to it is not the point. I remember one year I gave up candy. Do you know what I did once the Lenten fast was over on Holy Saturday? I ate a lot of candy. Instead of giving something up I would call on all of you to try and notice what it is about what you want to give up and meditate on it. Meditate on what it is you can do to overcome this idol. It's not a fast to just pause doing what you know is harmful to you and your relationship with God just to resume it when the fast ends. Let your Lenten reflection and fasts bring you closer to God and closer to setting aside that which is harmful to you or at least put that which you are fasting from in its proper place in your life. May a meditative and reflective peace be with you all this Lent. May God's grace and peace be with you all.

Ash Wednesday (Mt 6:1-6, 16-18)

I always had a quick chuckle that for Ash Wednesday our reading tells us not to "practice our piety before others" because we are walking around with a cross of ash on our foreheads. Then when you read further, we are told to pray in private and not act like the hypocrites and this begs the question "What are we doing, why are we walking around with this ash cross before others." That is where we can introduce the 4 steps of Luther's Four-stranded garland. (1) What is the text instructing us to do? If we read the very important charge in verse 1 it adds "in order to be seen by others" Jesus is not telling us that we are supposed to hide our faith, but that a living faith is more than just being seen living that faith. For Step (2) we examine the

thanksgiving, or how I am grateful this day through this text. For me, this text is redirecting my focus. The focus is not on the spiritual practice, or on me. The focus of the text is on the living faith for other that Jesus leads us in. Then in Step (3) we enter into a confession, a question on how I have not lived up to this focus and how must I, through the grace of Jesus Christ change my focus this Lenten season. Finally, with Step (4) we enter into a prayer. We end our exercise in a prayer of hope that we will see the promise that Jesus is leading us to in the text. These 4 steps can be adapted to any text. You can use in your daily readings, or with any text you sense the Holy Spirit leading you to engaging with.

#### First Wednesday of Lent

(Jonah 3:1-10)

We all know the story of Jonah. Finally, out of the whale, he proceeds to Ninevah to deliver God's message. The people of Ninevah have forgotten the ways of the Lord, and as we have learned many of times in scripture, memory and especially remembering are key terms to tell us something is going on. Jonah gets to Ninevah and he sure starts a whirlwind with his proclamations, and that is where I call on us to start. This time through Ignatian Imaginative prayer. I'm sure there is a call in all of our lives on where we need to slow down and repent. With the first step, let us state out intention for this prayer before we enter the scene. Now let us enter the scene. Take a deep centering breath, read the text and imagine being in Ninevah, you hear this message that is in your heart and it is calling you and pulling you. Try to imagine as many details of the scenery as you can, use all your senses to truly enter in the text and be a part of the scene. Interact with other characters you may see, how are you experiencing what is happening. Let each one of your senses speak to you in the prayer and examine where they are leading you. The purpose of this exercise is to live inside the scene, to see where is that God is calling you to go. Do not let yourself get bogged down in the whirlwind, or in the penance. Remember that God's grace will carry you through and that God is with you on this journey. Any time you find yourself losing focus, you can always take a pause with a deep centering breath. When you are finished with your prayer you can conclude with the Lord's Prayer.

#### **Second Wednesday of Lent**

(Mt 20:17-28)

As we continue this Lenten journey, a journey of refocus, we arrive at a familiar text that is asking us a familiar question from week one. Why does the mother of the sons of Zebedee want her sons to sit at the right and left hand of Jesus? For the sons of Zebedee, they still hold onto this notion of doing this and doing that to be seen. They want to be seen in the place of honor. Everyone wants recognition, but what they want is more than that.

As we continue with the text, let us focus on verse 25. Let us focus through a lectio divina, or a sacred reading on what in our lives are tyrants over us, and how to redirect our focus and see where God is leading us. We start in the scene that 17-22 created, but we focus on 23-28. Step (1) we read the text slowly, focus on a word that leaps out, an image. Where is the Holy Spirit waving at you, or inviting you in. Step (2) focus again on that image, or word. Read through again with the intent on seeing where God is leading you this day. Reflect on the why? Step (3) you respond to the text. Remember, you respond with patience. The answers will not always leap at you. Listen with patience, remembering that this is a loving encounter with your creator. Step (4) a final reading, a reading in the sense of prayer. You conclude the conversation and let yourself leave in peace. The peace you leave is can propel you through the week, or help you get a new understanding of the text and what it is to serve. Remember the importance of taking deep centering breaths between the steps.

# Third Wednesday of Lent (Deuteronomy 4:1. 5-9)

Moses spoke and the people listened, Moses implored the people to remember the words of the Lord and the people would often have a rocky road and forget. As we arrive at our midpoint of our Lenten journey, I want us to focus on memory, on where we have been forgetful and where the Holy Spirit is leading us back towards God's. For this we can pray through a Daily Examen, we can either pray through this examen every day until next Wednesday, or whatever days we feel the call to. Step (1) We become aware of God's presence, we recognize that we are a loved and cherished sinner in the presence of a God who loves us. Step (2) we review our day with gratitude. We look through that day and try to see were God as talking to us and leading us, where we felt grateful for that presence. Step (3) we review our whole day and we pay attention to how we responded to God's presence and were we felt God's presence. What was God' leading us to do, how did we respond, where we open to the growth the Spirit was leading us in, where were we most resistant. Step (4) we pick one moment that sticks out and we pray on that moment. Why does this moment stick out, where was God, where were we? We know what we have been taught, what we know of God's grace, did we live it, or did we ignore it. Step (5) we pray for the day that is to come and try and prepare through prayer for that day. Finally, we say the Lord's prayer and we go on with our night in the peace and comfort of God's grace.

Now let us enter the scene. Take a deep centering breath, read the text and imagine being in Ninevah, you hear this message that is in your heart and it is calling you and pulling you. Try to imagine as many details of the scenery as you can, use all your senses to truly enter in the text and be a part of the scene. Interact with other characters you may see, how are you experiencing what is happening. Let each one of your senses speak to you in the prayer and examine where they are leading you. The purpose of this exercise is to live inside the scene, to see where is that God is calling you to go. Do not let yourself get bogged down in the whirlwind, or in the penance. Remember that God's grace will carry you through and that God is with you on this journey. Any time you find yourself losing focus, you can always take a pause with a deep centering breath. When you are finished with your prayer you can conclude with the Lord's Prayer.

#### **Second Wednesday of Lent**

(Mt 20:17-28)

As we continue this Lenten journey, a journey of refocus, we arrive at a familiar text that is asking us a familiar question from week one. Why does the mother of the sons of Zebedee want her sons to sit at the right and left hand of Jesus? For the sons of Zebedee, they still hold onto this notion of doing this and doing that to be seen. They want to be seen in the place of honor. Everyone wants recognition, but what they want is more than that.

As we continue with the text, let us focus on verse 25. Let us focus through a lectio divina, or a sacred reading on what in our lives are tyrants over us, and how to redirect our focus and see where God is leading us. We start in the scene that 17-22 created, but we focus on 23-28. Step (1) we read the text slowly, focus on a word that leaps out, an image. Where is the Holy Spirit waving at you, or inviting you in. Step (2) focus again on that image, or word. Read through again with the intent on seeing where God is leading you this day. Reflect on the why?. Step (3) you respond to the text. Remember, you respond with patience. The answers will not always leap at you. Listen with patience, remembering that this is a loving encounter with your creator. Step (4) a final reading, a reading in the sense of prayer. You conclude the conversation and let yourself leave in peace. The peace you leave is can propel you through the week, or help you get a new understanding of the text and what it is to serve. Remember the importance of taking deep centering breaths between the steps.

# Third Wednesday of Lent (Deuteronomy 4:1. 5-9)

Moses spoke and the people listened, Moses implored the people to remember the words of the Lord and the people would often have a rocky road and forget. As we arrive at our midpoint of our Lenten journey, I want us to focus on memory, on where we have been forgetful and where the Holy Spirit is leading us back towards God's. For this we can pray through a Daily Examen, we can either pray through this examen every day until next Wednesday, or whatever days we feel the call to. Step (1) We become aware of God's presence, we recognize that we are a loved and cherished sinner in the presence of a God who loves us. Step (2) we review our day with gratitude. We look through that day and try to see were God as talking to us and leading us, where we felt grateful for that presence. Step (3) we review our whole day and we pay attention to how we responded to God's presence and were we felt God's presence. What was God' leading us to do, how did we respond, where we open to the growth the Spirit was leading us in, where were we most resistant. Step (4) we pick one moment that sticks out and we pray on that moment. Why does this moment stick out, where was God, where were we? We know what we have been taught, what we know of God's grace, did we live it, or did we ignore it. Step (5) we pray for the day that is to come and try and prepare through prayer for that day. Finally, we say the Lord's prayer and we go on with our night in the peace and comfort of God's grace.

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Lenten Mid-Week devotionals that will begin on Wednesday March 12<sup>th</sup> at Durham. These devotionals are great opportunity to reflect on our relationship with God and one another. They are more conversational and personal. I hope to see you all there. Lent is a time of deep reflection and even fasting. I am often asked "What are you giving up for Lent". I always try to remind all that giving something up for Lent is a good practice. It helps remind us that God should be the focus in our lives. That the things that distract us and replace God are just empty idols. However, giving something up for 40 days and 40 nights just to go back to it is not the point. I remember one year I gave up candy. Do you know what I did once the Lenten fast was over on Holy Saturday? I ate a lot of candy. Instead of giving something up I would call on all of you to try and notice what it is about what you want to give up and meditate on it. Meditate on what it is you can do to overcome this idol. It's not a fast to just pause doing what you know is harmful to you and your relationship with God just to resume it when the fast ends. Let your Lenten reflection and fasts bring you closer to God and closer to setting aside that which is harmful to you or at least put that which you are fasting from in its proper place in your life. May a meditative and reflective peace be with you all this Lent. May God's grace and peace be with you all.

Ash Wednesday (Mt 6:1-6, 16-18)

I always had a quick chuckle that for Ash Wednesday our reading tells us not to "practice our piety before others" because we are walking around with a cross of ash on our foreheads. Then when you read further, we are told to pray in private and not act like the hypocrites and this begs the question "What are we doing, why are we walking around with this ash cross before others." That is where we can introduce the 4 steps of Luther's Four-stranded garland. (1) What is the text instructing us to do? If we read the very important charge in verse 1 it adds "in order to be seen by others" Jesus is not telling us that we are supposed to hide our faith, but that a living faith is more than just being seen living that faith. For Step (2) we examine the

thanksgiving, or how I am grateful this day through this text. For me, this text is redirecting my focus. The focus is not on the spiritual practice, or on me. The focus of the text is on the living faith for other that Jesus leads us in. Then in Step (3) we enter into a confession, a question on how I have not lived up to this focus and how must I, through the grace of Jesus Christ change my focus this Lenten season. Finally, with Step (4) we enter into a prayer. We end our exercise in a prayer of hope that we will see the promise that Jesus is leading us to in the text. These 4 steps can be adapted to any text. You can use in your daily readings, or with any text you sense the Holy Spirit leading you to engaging with.

#### First Wednesday of Lent

(Jonah 3:1-10)

We all know the story of Jonah. Finally, out of the whale, he proceeds to Ninevah to deliver God's message. The people of Ninevah have forgotten the ways of the Lord, and as we have learned many of times in scripture, memory and especially remembering are key terms to tell us something is going on. Jonah gets to Ninevah and he sure starts a whirlwind with his proclamations, and that is where I call on us to start. This time through Ignatian Imaginative prayer. I'm sure there is a call in all of our lives on where we need to slow down and repent. With the first step, let us state out intention for this prayer before we enter the scene. Now let us enter the scene. Take a deep centering breath, read the text and imagine being in Ninevah, you hear this message that is in your heart and it is calling you and pulling you. Try to imagine as many details of the scenery as you can, use all your senses to truly enter in the text and be a part of the scene. Interact with other characters you may see, how are you experiencing what is happening. Let each one of your senses speak to you in the prayer and examine where they are leading you. The purpose of this exercise is to live inside the scene, to see where is that God is calling you to go. Do not let yourself get bogged down in the whirlwind, or in the penance. Remember that God's grace will carry you through and that God is with you on this journey. Any time you find yourself losing focus, you can always take a pause with a deep centering breath. When you are finished with your prayer you can conclude with the Lord's Prayer.

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Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ. Lent is one of my favorite times of the church year. Many are weary of Lent; however, I enjoy the meditative nature of the season. When I was in internship I wrote a Lenten devotional as part of my internship project. I would like to share the first 3 weeks of that devotional with all of you, in April I will share the final 2 weeks of the devotional. I am hoping this devotional will help you on your Lenten journey

Lenten Mid-Week devotionals that will begin on Wednesday March 12<sup>th</sup> at Durham. These devotionals are great opportunity to reflect on our relationship with God and one another. They are more conversational and personal. I hope to see you all there. Lent is a time of deep reflection and even fasting. I am often asked "What are you giving up for Lent". I always try to remind all that giving something up for Lent is a good practice. It helps remind us that God should be the focus in our lives. That the things that distract us and replace God are just empty idols. However, giving something up for 40 days and 40 nights just to go back to it is not the point. I remember one year I gave up candy. Do you know what I did once the Lenten fast was over on Holy Saturday? I ate a lot of candy. Instead of giving something up I would call on all of you to try and notice what it is about what you want to give up and meditate on it. Meditate on what it is you can do to overcome this idol. It's not a fast to just pause doing what you know is harmful to you and your relationship with God just to resume it when the fast ends. Let your Lenten reflection and fasts bring you closer to God and closer to setting aside that which is harmful to you or at least put that which you are fasting from in its proper place in your life. May a meditative and reflective peace be with you all this Lent. May God's grace and peace be with you all.

Ash Wednesday (Mt 6:1-6, 16-18)

I always had a quick chuckle that for Ash Wednesday our reading tells us not to "practice our piety before others" because we are walking around with a cross of ash on our foreheads. Then when you read further, we are told to pray in private and not act like the hypocrites and this begs the question "What are we doing, why are we walking around with this ash cross before others." That is where we can introduce the 4 steps of Luther's Four-stranded garland. (1) What is the text instructing us to do? If we read the very important charge in verse 1 it adds "in order to be seen by others" Jesus is not telling us that we are supposed to hide our faith, but that a living faith is more than just being seen living that faith. For Step (2) we examine the

thanksgiving, or how I am grateful this day through this text. For me, this text is redirecting my focus. The focus is not on the spiritual practice, or on me. The focus of the text is on the living faith for other that Jesus leads us in. Then in Step (3) we enter into a confession, a question on how I have not lived up to this focus and how must I, through the grace of Jesus Christ change my focus this Lenten season. Finally, with Step (4) we enter into a prayer. We end our exercise in a prayer of hope that we will see the promise that Jesus is leading us to in the text. These 4 steps can be adapted to any text. You can use in your daily readings, or with any text you sense the Holy Spirit leading you to engaging with.

#### First Wednesday of Lent

(Jonah 3:1-10)

We all know the story of Jonah. Finally, out of the whale, he proceeds to Ninevah to deliver God's message. The people of Ninevah have forgotten the ways of the Lord, and as we have learned many of times in scripture, memory and especially remembering are key terms to tell us something is going on. Jonah gets to Ninevah and he sure starts a whirlwind with his proclamations, and that is where I call on us to start. This time through Ignatian Imaginative prayer. I'm sure there is a call in all of our lives on where we need to slow down and repent. With the first step, let us state out intention for this prayer before we enter the scene. Now let us enter the scene. Take a deep centering breath, read the text and imagine being in Ninevah, you hear this message that is in your heart and it is calling you and pulling you. Try to imagine as many details of the scenery as you can, use all your senses to truly enter in the text and be a part of the scene. Interact with other characters you may see, how are you experiencing what is happening. Let each one of your senses speak to you in the prayer and examine where they are leading you. The purpose of this exercise is to live inside the scene, to see where is that God is calling you to go. Do not let yourself get bogged down in the whirlwind, or in the penance. Remember that God's grace will carry you through and that God is with you on this journey. Any time you find yourself losing focus, you can always take a pause with a deep centering breath. When you are finished with your prayer you can conclude with the Lord's Prayer.

#### **Second Wednesday of Lent**

(Mt 20:17-28)

As we continue this Lenten journey, a journey of refocus, we arrive at a familiar text that is asking us a familiar question from week one. Why does the mother of the sons of Zebedee want her sons to sit at the right and left hand of Jesus? For the sons of Zebedee, they still hold onto this notion of doing this and doing that to be seen. They want to be seen in the place of honor. Everyone wants recognition, but what they want is more than that.

As we continue with the text, let us focus on verse 25. Let us focus through a lectio divina, or a sacred reading on what in our lives are tyrants over us, and how to redirect our focus and see where God is leading us. We start in the scene that 17-22 created, but we focus on 23-28. Step (1) we read the text slowly, focus on a word that leaps out, an image. Where is the Holy Spirit waving at you, or inviting you in. Step (2) focus again on that image, or word. Read through again with the intent on seeing where God is leading you this day. Reflect on the why?. Step (3) you respond to the text. Remember, you respond with patience. The answers will not always leap at you. Listen with patience, remembering that this is a loving encounter with your creator. Step (4) a final reading, a reading in the sense of prayer. You conclude the conversation and let yourself leave in peace. The peace you leave is can propel you through the week, or help you get a new understanding of the text and what it is to serve. Remember the importance of taking deep centering breaths between the steps.

# Third Wednesday of Lent (Deuteronomy 4:1. 5-9)

Moses spoke and the people listened, Moses implored the people to remember the words of the Lord and the people would often have a rocky road and forget. As we arrive at our midpoint of our Lenten journey, I want us to focus on memory, on where we have been forgetful and where the Holy Spirit is leading us back towards God's. For this we can pray through a Daily Examen, we can either pray through this examen every day until next Wednesday, or whatever days we feel the call to. Step (1) We become aware of God's presence, we recognize that we are a loved and cherished sinner in the presence of a God who loves us. Step (2) we review our day with gratitude. We look through that day and try to see were God as talking to us and leading us, where we felt grateful for that presence. Step (3) we review our whole day and we pay attention to how we responded to God's presence and were we felt God's presence. What was God' leading us to do, how did we respond, where we open to the growth the Spirit was leading us in, where were we most resistant. Step (4) we pick one moment that sticks out and we pray on that moment. Why does this moment stick out, where was God, where were we? We know what we have been taught, what we know of God's grace, did we live it, or did we ignore it. Step (5) we pray for the day that is to come and try and prepare through prayer for that day. Finally, we say the Lord's prayer and we go on with our night in the peace and comfort of God's grace.

# Our congratulations and best wishes to all those celebrating special days in March!



Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ. Lent is one of my favorite times of the church year. Many are weary of Lent; however, I enjoy the meditative nature of the season. When I was in internship I wrote a Lenten devotional as part of my internship project. I would like to share the first 3 weeks of that devotional with all of you, in April I will share the final 2 weeks of the devotional. I am hoping this devotional will help you on your Lenten journey

Lenten Mid-Week devotionals that will begin on Wednesday March 12<sup>th</sup> at Durham. These devotionals are great opportunity to reflect on our relationship with God and one another. They are more conversational and personal. I hope to see you all there. Lent is a time of deep reflection and even fasting. I am often asked "What are you giving up for Lent". I always try to remind all that giving something up for Lent is a good practice. It helps remind us that God should be the focus in our lives. That the things that distract us and replace God are just empty idols. However, giving something up for 40 days and 40 nights just to go back to it is not the point. I remember one year I gave up candy. Do you know what I did once the Lenten fast was over on Holy Saturday? I ate a lot of candy. Instead of giving something up I would call on all of you to try and notice what it is about what you want to give up and meditate on it. Meditate on what it is you can do to overcome this idol. It's not a fast to just pause doing what you know is harmful to you and your relationship with God just to resume it when the fast ends. Let your Lenten reflection and fasts bring you closer to God and closer to setting aside that which is harmful to you or at least put that which you are fasting from in its proper place in your life. May a meditative and reflective peace be with you all this Lent. May God's grace and peace be with you all.

Ash Wednesday (Mt 6:1-6, 16-18)

I always had a quick chuckle that for Ash Wednesday our reading tells us not to "practice our piety before others" because we are walking around with a cross of ash on our foreheads. Then when you read further, we are told to pray in private and not act like the hypocrites and this begs the question "What are we doing, why are we walking around with this ash cross before others." That is where we can introduce the 4 steps of Luther's Four-stranded garland. (1) What is the text instructing us to do? If we read the very important charge in verse 1 it adds "in order to be seen by others" Jesus is not telling us that we are supposed to hide our faith, but that a living faith is more than just being seen living that faith. For Step (2) we examine the

thanksgiving, or how I am grateful this day through this text. For me, this text is redirecting my focus. The focus is not on the spiritual practice, or on me. The focus of the text is on the living faith for other that Jesus leads us in. Then in Step (3) we enter into a confession, a question on how I have not lived up to this focus and how must I, through the grace of Jesus Christ change my focus this Lenten season. Finally, with Step (4) we enter into a prayer. We end our exercise in a prayer of hope that we will see the promise that Jesus is leading us to in the text. These 4 steps can be adapted to any text. You can use in your daily readings, or with any text you sense the Holy Spirit leading you to engaging with.

#### First Wednesday of Lent

(Jonah 3:1-10)

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#### **Second Wednesday of Lent**

(Mt 20:17-28)

As we continue this Lenten journey, a journey of refocus, we arrive at a familiar text that is asking us a familiar question from week one. Why does the mother of the sons of Zebedee want her sons to sit at the right and left hand of Jesus? For the sons of Zebedee, they still hold onto this notion of doing this and doing that to be seen. They want to be seen in the place of honor. Everyone wants recognition, but what they want is more than that.

As we continue with the text, let us focus on verse 25. Let us focus through a lectio divina, or a sacred reading on what in our lives are tyrants over us, and how to redirect our focus and see where God is leading us. We start in the scene that 17-22 created, but we focus on 23-28. Step (1) we read the text slowly, focus on a word that leaps out, an image. Where is the Holy Spirit waving at you, or inviting you in. Step (2) focus again on that image, or word. Read through again with the intent on seeing where God is leading you this day. Reflect on the why?. Step (3) you respond to the text. Remember, you respond with patience. The answers will not always leap at you. Listen with patience, remembering that this is a loving encounter with your creator. Step (4) a final reading, a reading in the sense of prayer. You conclude the conversation and let yourself leave in peace. The peace you leave is can propel you through the week, or help you get a new understanding of the text and what it is to serve. Remember the importance of taking deep centering breaths between the steps.
